SOCIAL MEDIA



THE SEARCH FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

It is common knowledge that higher-level education does not come cheap in the United States, and those who attend must be prepared to pay heaps of money for a University education.

"For many people, college is hard to pay for, especially since over the years, college tuition rates have only been increasing," states IB Junior **Samantha Jayakody.**

To assist with such a feat, financial aid in the form of scholarships or grants are offered to students. With the help of these money-makers, students can take a step back and slightly relax without the burden of possible excessive student debt in the future. This is exactly the thought process of the graduating class of 2021 and current juniors.

"I do believe that scholarships are essential for students as they are financially helpful when it comes to applying for favorable colleges or universities," expresses Junior **Kamala Sairaman**.

Scholarships offered are not only a reprieve from the burdens of possible student debt but a chance of hope for those with financial issues. The monetary aid provided is not based on gender, race, or culture, but on academic and athletic prowess, successfully offering an equal chance to those in need.

There are numerous opportunities for graduating seniors and rising juniors to earn such scholarships. College Board is a prime example of such an opportunity. The renowned non-profit organization is a bridge between students and higher-level education, connecting high school students with multiple educational possibilities. The organization itself has a scholarship program: The College Board Opportunity Scholarship program.

"This program is open to students regardless of their family income. At least half of all scholarships (over \$2 million) will be designated for students whose families earn less than \$60,000 a year. Whenever students who meet these requirements complete a step, they'll earn an extra entry in monthly drawings for scholarships," offers the College Board Website.

Thousands of students across the nation have been helped through this program's grants and scholarships. The program offers a variety of scholarships, each specific to a different goal or aspect of education. For instance,

taking the PSAT allows students to unlock scholarships of different value based on their score such as the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship (PSAT/NMSQT).

Another highly acknowledged organization offering scholarships is a Florida-based program called Bright Futures. Known for its generous grants and monetary aid, this program is an immense help to Floridian students staying in-state for college. Bright Futures funds college education for high-school students across Florida based on academic success and achievement. Anything from a respectable PSAT score to phenomenal grades or extracurricular performance is rewarded by this program. Bright Futures is a perfect option for any high-school student planning to attend college in Florida. Many SHS students have admitted that staying in-state is a possibility due to Bright Futures' scholarships or grants.

"I do consider staying in-state as an option because of Bright Futures. It has different levels of money one can receive, so I will try my best to get what I can. I also think having Florida prepaid is a huge benefit that will hopefully help," explains Jayakody.

However, a drawback of this program is the citizenship requirement which doesn't allow immigrants or international students to apply for such financial aid.

Sairaman ponders that she "plans to apply for Bright Futures but is not sure if she is allowed to apply for many of the scholarships as she is an international student and not a citizen of Florida."

For more information on the Bright Futures Scholarship Program, visit the Florida Student Scholarships Grant Programs website. The requirements for each scholarship and details of each are listed.

Other scholarships are available through community service opportunities and organizations such as The Red Cross. Being a charitable community member through extracurriculars such as that previously mentioned can make you eligible for local scholarships or grants. Many seniors of the graduating class this year were able to be matched for a renowned scholarship program known as Questbridge. All in all, the scholarships available are for the benefit of the SHS juniors and seniors. Farewell and good luck, class of 2021!

The Questbridge Scholars of Seminole

Everywhere around the country people struggle to pay for college. To get around this, students can apply for scholarships to relieve some of the financial pressure associated with paying for college. Aid is especially important for middle and lower class students as college tuition rates become more expensive each year. For students meeting certain criteria, QuestBridge scholarships can be used to connect the students with leading institutions of higher education while providing financial compensation for their personal and academic achievements, taking away a majority of the economic burdens off of the shoulders of students and their families.

Destiny Ukachukwu, an International Bachelorette (IB) senior and QuestBridge recipient says "I think scholarships such as QuestBridge and Thrive Scholars are important because they encourage and enable minority populations to gain sufficient access to higher education. Without these such programs, I would not have ever applied to some of the nation's top universities yet aspire to attend one. I always thought that my family would never be able to afford these schools or that I would have no chance of being admitted. These programs informed me of everything I need to know about the college application process. They inspired and encouraged me to dream big and aim higher, and for that, I am forever grateful."

QuestBridge is an organization with the main aim to help students finance college. It is a non-profit based in California that helps low-income students across the country gain equal access to elite colleges. This helps create more equality in higher education and higher-level jobs. It matches the most exceptional low-income students and leading higher education institutions, helping future job prospects and opportunities. This also helps students become the first in their families to go to college. In fact, 70 percent of QuestBridge scholars are the first in their family to attend college. QuestBridge scholars receive full four-year college scholarships with the school they match with, making this scholarship highly competitive. Students accepted by QuestBridge can attend top colleges for free and utilize the education they gain positively.

Another QuestBridge recipient and IB senior, **Jordan Perez** says he was inspired by his parent's hard work and his grandfather who created a new life in America after emigrating from Colombia. He also credits his guidance counselor, Mrs. Frye for walking him through the application process.

Perez said "The application process was a little daunting at first. There were a lot of components that I felt were difficult to manage, but things became very facilitated very quickly.

Once I began to ask questions, either to people I had met through QuestBridge or to my counselor, the process became more manageable and in some ways, enjoyable, as I was filled with excitement through each phase of the process to see the results."

Ukachukwu also credits Mrs. Frye for her help but was also motivated to apply due to her personal past. Ukachukwu states, "For the first half of my life, I lived in Nigeria which is a developing country in West Africa. During my time there, my family was fortunate enough to be able to afford proper healthcare and resources to support ourselves. However, for the majority of the population, this is not the case. Many Nigerians died from common ailments because they lacked access to quality and affordable healthcare. Upon moving to the United States, I observed the quality and widespread accessibility of the healthcare system here. Though it is not perfect, it is much more developed than the healthcare system in Nigeria. This has inspired my goal of aspiring to bridge the disparity in healthcare systems across the world."

Ukachukwu was matched with Vanderbilt University and aspires to become a neonatologist.

As for Perez, he was matched with Washington University in St. Louis at the Olin school for Business. Originally he was not interested in business, but the story of his grandfather's progress and his parents' work inspired him to take an interest in business when applying to colleges.

When asked about how he will use his education, Perez says "In the future, I'd like to engage in health care administration. I have a strong attachment to both business and medicine, and I hope to engage in both in the future so that I can help people in any way I can through business"

All in all, these students worked extremely hard for these opportunities made possible with the QuestBridge scholarship and will continue to use their work ethic to learn and establish themselves in their careers, setting examples for future Seminole High School students just like them.

"I'm always questioning myself: Are my hands in the right place? Am I on the right foot? Am I even in the right spot? It's a lot of pressure and stress," states Curry.

What usually grounds Curry is not just simple reassurances, but the comfort she feels when she realizes that she is not alone in her worries. Everyone on the field is a family. According to Curry, all the people you get to know are the best part of band.

"Through the four years we get to know each other, we all become a big family. We may not get along all the time, but the memories we make together are great," says Curry.

Curry plans to stay in band for all four years, as well as continue playing percussion in college. Her future goals include expanding on piano, as she wants to become better at playing the keyed instrument. Currently a varsity golfer, Mahabir is one of the few sophomores playing on the team despite only joining this current school year. She plans on playing for the rest of high school, and hopefully college, as well. She was first introduced to the sport through her family, who all play golf at their nearby golf course. Mahabir may only have started playing golf in 9th grade but has a deep appreciation for the sport. Mahabir states that golf is a difficult game, both physically and mentally challenging. For Mahabir, the hardest part of being a golfer, however, is finding the motivation to continue after a bad swing or putt.

"Finding the motivation to do my best is difficult. I know I have days I am off my game, but after every bad shot I just say 'it could have been worse'. So, I walk it off and tell myself to do better in the next shot." expresses Mahabir.

However, hard work and needless motivation always pay off in the end. Mahabir's favorite moments occurred after hours of grueling training. Her favorite shots include putting from 30 feet, chipping a ball into a hole, and hitting the ball across the field through one whole game. However, she states that it is equally important to appreciate the worst shots to keep growing as a golfer.

The training for golf is approximately 12 hours a week. Mahabir and the rest of the team train for three hours on three days of the week, spending time on swings and shots to improve accuracy and gameplay. A lot of training and much schoolwork can be overwhelming at times, so Mahabir changes her perspective. With rising sea levels and frequent, drastic weather, global warming is an ever-present problem. Despite the increasing issue of climate change, human ignorance pushes climate concerns away, leaving them for the next generation. Yet, with limited time left, these problems need to be addressed. This begins with addressing fossil fuel companies like BP and Exxon Mobil, whose impact on the environment is perilous. There has been a record in the United States of oil companies being prosecuted for wrongdoings in state courts. However, recent cases involve two main questions: should fossil fuel companies be prosecuted in federal courts, and are fossil fuel companies responsible for the economic damages caused by climate change?

The latter question harkens back to the lawsuits surrounding cigarettes in the 80s and 90s. The case uncovered that during the marketing process of cigarettes, companies knew about its addictive properties and possible affiliation with lung disease and cancer. In the 80s and 90s, cigarette companies were found to be liable for such cases, leading to the legislation of cigarette marketing, packaging, and settlements for large sums of money. Similar claims are being made about fossil fuel companies; companies reaped profit while knowing how damaging fossil fuels were to the environment.

Further, the damages that fossil fuels have caused will cost an enormous amount of money. Some of these issues lie within the basic infrastructure of many cities. The old water systems cannot handle the higher tides and increased rainfall, resulting in a backup of sewage systems and flooding. Cities cannot afford to replace or renovate these systems.

Another issue fossil fuels cause is a rise in global temperatures. In colder places where the air conditioning is not popular, ventilation units must be added to make living comfortable and safe. The rise in temperatures also causes an increase in heat strokes and other heat-related problems. Heatstroke can cause damage to vital organs-including the brain and heart, muscle breakdown, and even death. It can require nearly a full year of medical care to recover fully. The higher temperatures also tend to cause asthma attacks for those who suffer from the mentioned infliction. Aside from these two medical issues with hot temperatures, any heat-related illness or injury is serious.

Another effect of climate change is more severe storms. This was shown this year during hurricane season along the gulf coast. The Louisiana area was battered by hurricane after hurricane. Each one seemed to set in before they could even recover from the last. As climate change

progresses, this will become normal. Places affected frequently by hurricanes, like Florida, are going to be hit harder and will need to adapt to these new weather patterns. This is again going to cost money because structures will need to be rebuilt to become more durable. This is also going to affect local economies, giving communities less money to recover.

The main concern with severe storms in central Florida are trees. Large, heavy trees will fall when major storms hit, knocking down power lines and generally causing destruction. In many places, burying power lines can make recovery easy, but some will still need to hang because they cannot go over roads.

Thus, there are a plethora of reasons why something must be done about climate change. With a new administration comes new plans; The Biden administration is taking a more environmentally friendly approach to what energy supplies we use and environmental protections.

One of these changes includes rejoining the Paris Climate Accords that former President Trump left in November 2019. The Paris agreement is a treaty that was signed by 196 countries in December 2015. It laid out a plan to keep the global temperature rise below 2 degrees Celsius than pre-industrial averages. This means relatively nothing because there is not much known about what Biden will do to limit greenhouse gas emissions. Rejoining this agreement is not as controversial as people assume, as many fossil fuel companies understand the need to be a

part of this change.

One campaign promise that has much more of an impact is Biden's promise to stop leasing new land for all oil and gas pursuits. Most of its effect will occur in places like Wyoming, New Mexico, and other states with federal lands. This is only a pause for 60 days, but there is a significant push to make this permanent. Biden has also canceled development on the controversial Keystone Pipeline, which would run close to indigenous land and cause water contamination.

Many steps are being taken locally. The Orlando Utilities Commission (OUC) has a long term goal of reaching net-zero carbon emissions by 2050 and a 50% reduction by 2050. These interim goals are where all progress is being made in small ways to get to these aspirations. This includes phasing out coal, which is one of the most environmentally damaging methods to obtain energy. The commission plans to phase coal out altogether within the decade and by 2027, they will not generate power through coal. Instead, the commission will expand their use of solar and natural gas to make up the difference.

All in all, the transition away from fossil fuels is essential and happening right here in our backyard. There is hope because there is a commitment in many utility companies to change.

NEW TECHNOLOGY RELEASES

During the past few months, technology continues to advance as new tech products have been released, causing mass excitement. The most popular among consumers are the iPhone 12, 12 Pro, and the Amazon Alexa Echo frames.

Apple continues to release new iPhones, with the 12 and 12 Pro released in Oct. The iPhone 12 is smaller and thinner than the past iPhones, which breaks the pattern of iPhones getting larger over the past few years. Additionally, damaging a phone screen will not pose as much of an issue as before with the new ceramic screen that has four times more protection when dropped. Not only are these new screens drop-proof, but they also protect against water damage. The cameras also have a dark mode, programmed to let in 27 times more light with the intention of taking better nighttime photos. Apple also took the time to improve the quality of portrait mode on their iPhone 12 and 12 Pro cameras. Capturing videos has been enhanced, as well, as the new products include 4K HDR with Dolby Vision. Another new feature with these iPhones is wireless charging, allowing users to charge the phone through Bluetooth as the charger attaches to the phone with a magnet. The compact frame and Bluetooth contribute to the carbon savings, as it removes unnecessary cables usually included in the iPhone packaging box. Those cables can usually be purchased separately from the iPhone and often are unused or kept as a backup, so the removal of these cables reduces the exploitation of resources needed to make them. It is estimated to reduce carbon emissions by 2 million metric tons. Cellular plans may affect the price of these phones but normally the iPhone 12 sells for \$799 while the iPhone 12 Pro goes for \$999. Overall, Apple consumers can expect to be shocked by Apple's new improvements.

Chloe Sakr, an International Bachelorette (IB) senior at Seminole High School (SHS), recently purchased the new iPhone 12. "I had an iPhone 8 before so I really liked the upgrade after 3 years. My new phone is a lot faster and has a lot more storage which was a really big problem for me with my old phone. I used to have to charge my old phone at least three times throughout the day, but with this phone, the battery life lasts all day."



Additionally, the release of the Alexa Echo frames allows Amazon users portable access to the information source of Alexa through a set of glasses. To get the frames, it is best to own an Alexa in your home and to have an android or iOS device, as well as an Alexa app on that device. You typically have to charge it daily, but streaming services for music may drain the battery quicker. The glasses turn on and off with a double press on the button and only respond to the voice you set. The Echo frames are glasses that can not only control the smart home like the Alexa does but can operate similar to a smartphone, as well. The glasses allow you to listen to music and podcasts, set reminders, access Siri, and control your smart home. The frames are compatible with any eyeglass prescription and are lightweight. They also direct sound to your ears and reduce the noise of others around you allowing for concentration and privacy. The Echo frames cost \$249.99 and have free shipping on the Amazon website.

Senior **Abigail Ragucci** believes that the echo frames seem unnecessary but can see the consumer appeal to the gadget. "It is probably easy to ask simple questions but using a phone or computer is more practical. But if the technology really influences your life positively, it would be worth buying," states Ragucci.

These new products are quite expensive, but the quality and advanced features they offer make them well worth their price. With new releases around the corner, technology consumers should anticipate more excitement with future releases.
